THE PASTOR'S CORNER "God's Handiwork"

I don't know about you, but I have really enjoyed shaping and reshaping my little glob of Play-Doh! It is a great reminder that we are to remain as flexible as Play-Doh in the hands of God. Flexible enough to let the Spirit move us in directions we may not have anticipated or even imagined. Yet, if truth be told, I'm probably not as flexible as I need to be. What about you? On a scale of one to ten, how flexible are you in God's hands these days?

I know that when my husband's sister unexpectedly moved into our home due to her car accident, I had to make some adjustments. Her health challenges made it imperative that we remain flexible in order to navigate her needs. For six weeks my schedule had to flex again and again. Yet, her stay also exposed some areas of inflexibility. Her stay made it clear that I had some dryness that could use a little more living water so that I could remain malleable.

What helps you stay malleable in the hands of God? What keeps you from getting dried out and brittle, like Play-doh that is not resealed in its container? In my life there are three main areas that help my spirit stay malleable: solitude, the natural world, and family.

Solitude gives me the ability to let go of all that is pressing in on me. I know that for my spirit to stay malleable I need to step away and take a break from the incessant input of our 24/7 wired world. Emails and texts need to be ignored. Talking, writing, and even reading, needs to be set aside. I simply have to practice just being, for are we not human beings, rather than human doings? When I make room for solitude and its twin, silence, I am able to hear the stirrings of God's Spirit reshaping my life.

Spending time noticing and being in the natural world also helps make me more malleable. It does so, by helping me gain perspective on my place in this cosmos that God created. Whether I am in my backyard, on a walk in


FIRST PRESBYTERIAN MONTHLY BOOK CLUB



THE GIFT OF THE CONNECTIONAL CHURCH WHY PER CAPITA?

Per Capita is the mechanism that connects members of local Presbyterian churches with the larger church, for per capita helps supports ministry at the Presbytery, Synod, and General level. It is considered an additional gift each member is asked to make each in year support the Connectional Church. We have been blessed incredibly by the Connectional Church in the past year for we received a \$130,000 in grants to help us with our sanctuary renovation!

As of January 30 we have received **\$1,370** towards our commitment of **\$6,720**, which represents \$40.00 per member. Here is how this gift will be distributed:

Presbytery \$27.30 Synod \$ 2.85 General Assembly \$ 9.85

Our gift is paid in six increments, which starts in February.

Per capita is a funding stream that came from the belief that God is calling us to work together. Rev. Dr. Timothy Hart-Anderson writes, "There are good theological and biblical arguments in support of per capita. It is the connective tissue in the body imagery of the Apostle Paul — "But in fact God has placed the parts in the body, every one of them, just as he wanted them to be" (1 Corinthians 12:18, NIV). Per capita provides the wherewithal for the ecclesiastical democracy of the priesthood of all believers to run smoothly. It fuels the machinery of doing church the Presbyterian way, which is quite different from independent congregational and bishop-based systems. Per capita is much more than a tax or funding model. It's a statement of what our values are. What a gift it is to know that we are in ministry with others.


And in times of crisis, per capita payments provide the funding for presbytery, synod, and General Assembly to support churches. Our connectional structure stepped into action this past October when Pastor Cheryl was unexpectedly away for a month, as pastors from around the Presbytery offered to assist in her absence. As said before, per capita is a statement of what are values are – we are stronger together in Christ.

If you are a member, please consider giving this extra gift above and beyond your financial pledge.

Biblical Reading Challenge Have you Started Reading Matthew Yet?

You may have noticed we have spent quite a bit of time in the Gospel of Matthew since the beginning of Advent. In the Revised Common Lectionary, we are in Year A, which is the Gospel of Matthew. Matthew states at the beginning of his gospel, "An accountant of the genealogy of Jesus the Messiah, the son of David, the son of Abraham. Jesus is given an identity, "the Messiah," which means the anointed one. Jesus is also connected to the Hebrew people, "The son of David, the son of Abraham." What comes next in this, "Now the birth of Jesus the Messiah took place in this way." Notice that Joseph is central in Matthew, not Mary as in Luke's Gospel. Notice also that the birth narratives are only found in Matthew and Luke, from which we build the story we retell every Christmas. What else do you notice in the first three chapters so far? Share what you have found or the questions you still have with others!

Dive into the word of God as it comes to us through the Gospel of Matthew this year. Invite the Holy Spirit to bring you a fresh word as you read through this gospel remembering that word of God is living and active, sharper than a two edged sword!

Praying the Gospel of Matthew

Hopefully you have had the chance to begin reading the Gospel of Matthew this year. Last month I asked you to pray with the genealogy found in the Gospel. This month I move us beyond Joseph's dreams to John the Baptist. Here is the text for this month:

"In those days John the Baptist appeared in the wilderness of Judea, proclaiming, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven has come near.' This is the one of whom the prophet Isaiah spoke when he said: 'The voice of the one crying out in the wilderness: Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight."

This isn't this first time Matthew has quoted from the Hebrew texts. It is the fourth time since the beginning of his Gospel. Why do you think Matthew found this important to include? What does this say about his audience? As you continue to pray with the Gospel of Matthew, what other verses from the Hebrew Scriptures come to mind for you in the first three chapters? Have fun and explore the Hebrew scripture passages that are referenced!

PROPERTY AND FINANCE UPDATE



John Knox Hall

Have you been in John Knox Hall lately? If not, come take a look! There is new carpeting in the entry vestibule between the glass doors as well as small section of carpet in the actual hall. All the molding has also been replaced. A small improvement that might go unnoticed, so take a look!

Sanctuary Renovation

Have you had the opportunity to make a gift yet to the sanctuary renovation project? As the project gets underway, our continued generosity will be needed to meet all the goals of the project. We have received \$269,492, which includes the \$130,000 from the Presbytery and Synod grants as of 12-31-2022. The architect is working to complete construction drawings by March, so the construction part of the project can go out to bid. The contract with Tech Arts has been signed and the first payment of \$93,004 has been issued. If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to ask.

Financial Update as of December 31, 2022

Here are some broad highlights from our financial reporting Year to Date December 31, 2022:

So, what do these numbers mean? We ended the year spending \$10,286 more than we received for our operating expenditures. The Adjusted NUI happens below the Net Unrestricted Income (NUI) line because the principal on the loan payments are not an expense, but a reduction in liability. We reduced our loan liability by \$7,683.10 in 2022.

Our pledges and donations were lower than anticipated in 2022, by \$26,801. Our rental income was higher than anticipated by \$9,351. The negative balance at the end of the year, reduced our financial cushion in our general checking account. What is clear is our ministries are made possible by our collective generosity as well as wise stewardship of our buildings.



And **love** visited me


And it reminded me

On January 7, 2023, the elders and deacons came together for a time of reflection and planning. We began by reflecting on scripture and our past year together, noting how God had blessed us as we continued to emerge from the pandemic:

Freeing Jesus: Rediscovering Jesus as Friend, Teacher, Savior, Lord, Way, and Presence is a book by Diana Butler Bass published in 2021. The church has purchased five copies that can be circulated during this Lenten season. They will be in the office soon!

I give thanks to my Princeton Preaching Cohort as we have worked together on this series, with each of us doing a deep dive into one chapter of the book to provide resources for all of us. I chose to explore more deeply the chapter on *Jesus as the Way* from the passage in John's Gospel that is often used as a bludgeon rather than an invitation, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life" [John 14:6a]. 

SABBATICAL LISTENING SESSIONS

I want to thank everyone who participated in these listening Sessions, as they were very helpful. I also appreciated those who offered to help perfect the grant by being readers and editors! I hope to have a first draft completed by February 13th, so stay tuned! The draft grant will go to the Session on February 20th for review as well. It would be wonderful to submit it before the deadline of March 15th, but that is yet to be accomplished!

A pastor renewal grant is designed to renew the soul of a pastor. As you probably all know, the pastoral position is not just a Sunday morning responsibility. There is much that goes on behind the scenes to make Sundays happen such as sermon planning and writing, planning, designing, and writing worship services as well as pastoral visitations, committee work, presbytery involvement, community involvement, and much administrative work. The work is never done and there is always more that could be done. And so, every seven years this Presbytery asks the congregation to support their pastors with a three-month paid sabbatical to renew their souls.

You might ask how is a sabbatical different from an extended vacation. The big difference is pastors must still plan everything that is going to happen in their absence. For vacations, they secure the preacher and write each weekly service. They also arrange for pastoral care in case of emergencies. To be gone takes work in advance, because everything must be organized and in the office before the pastor leaves and the work that is not done on Sunday's is still there when the pastor returns from vacation. A sabbatical gives pastors the opportunity to lay down all responsibilities and place them in another person's hands for three months. This will make a way for deep renewal and restoration of a pastor's soul for another season of ministry together.

We have much work to do to be prepared for my sabbatical which is currently planned for June 2024 through September 3, 2024, with the final weekend being my annual Labor Day weekend with family and friends. If you have any questions, please do not hesitate to ask me, as I would love to tell you about my plans.



Thank you for generously giving to the ministries of this church, no matter how you give!


MOMENT FOR DEACONS

- Muddied lines, especially about fellowship... as elders or deacons we need to encourage those who will be active in their commitment;
- Space and care for toddlers (younger than Kindergarten) on Sunday mornings (redo the Nursery Room and find staff/volunteers);
- Technology have a "back-up sermon" available in case of emergency.

We also did some brainstorming together about the planning that needs to be done in preparation of Pastor Cheryl's sabbatical in 2024. The sabbatical is to be rich with renewal for Pastor Cheryl's soul and our soul as a congregation. What became clear in our discussion is that the Session will need to plan for consistent pastoral presence during the sabbatical. The information gathered from our discussion will help Pastor Cheryl with the grant proposal being drafted for presentation to the Session in February.

The final discussion centered around how to do the work of the church through our various boards and committees. Here is the structure for 2023:

• **Property and Finance Committee** (property management, property maintenance and improvement, and finances)
