## The Pastor's Corner A Message from Pastor Rubens

#### The Future of the Church in a Post-COVID World

As we have reflected on the past few weeks, the challenges faced by humanity during the COVID-19 pandemic have prompted a profound reevaluation of our purpose and mission as a community of disciples of Christ. Klaus Schwab, president of the World Economic Forum, termed this period the "Great Reset," a concept that can equally apply to the church. This reset calls us to rethink and realign our focus on the core values of koinonia (fellowship), kerygma (proclamation), diakonia (service), and martyria (witness). These values, rooted deeply in the New Testament, offer a blueprint for the church's renewal and growth in the post-COVID era.

#### Koinonia: Reimagining Fellowship

The Greek term *koinonia* describes the essence of Christian community and fellowship. It reminds us that the church is more than just a collection of activities and gatherings; it is the body of Christ, animated by the Holy Spirit. Our fellowship must go beyond mere social interaction to embody a true community of love. Jesus emphasized that His disciples would be known by their love for one another (John 13:35). This love transcends cultural, ethnic, and social boundaries, creating a diverse yet unified body of believers.

However, the reality often falls short of this ideal. Ronald Enroth, in his book "Churches That Abuse," highlights the dangers of control-oriented leadership, manipulation, and emotional abuse within some church communities. To avoid these pitfalls, we must foster an environment of genuine care and acceptance, where each member is valued and supported. Embracing *koinonia* involves active participation in each other's spiritual journeys, promoting peace, humility, and mutual respect.




### THE GIFT OF THE CONNECTIONAL CHURCH PER CAPITA—ABOVE AND BEYOND GIVING

#### Kerygma: Proclaiming the Message of Christ

*Kerygma*, the proclamation of the gospel, is central to the church's mission. Martin Lloyd Jones noted that periods of church decline often coincide with a neglect of preaching. The essence of our message is not found in doctrines or creeds, but in the person of Jesus Christ. The TV series "The Chosen" illustrates this by portraying the lives and struggles of Jesus' disciples, making the gospel story relevant to contemporary audiences.

Our proclamation must be Christ-centered, emphasizing His presence in our lives and communities. It is through living like Christ embracing His values of love, justice, and compassion—that we truly communicate the gospel. The real measure of success in ministry is not in numbers or programs, but in how faithfully we reflect Christ's character and mission.

#### **Diakonia: Serving with Compassion**

*Diakonia*, or service, calls us to extend Christ's love through acts of compassion and care. The early church exemplified this by caring for widows and the needy (Acts 6:1). Today, the scope of *diakonia* is vast, encompassing local and global efforts to alleviate suffering and promote justice. From addressing homelessness in Redlands to supporting refugees worldwide, our service must be holistic, integrating soul care with social action.

Harvey Cox emphasizes that *diakonia* involves healing and reconciling, restoring health to the body of Christ. This means actively engaging with the needs of our communities, providing not just spiritual support but also practical assistance. The integration of evangelism and social responsibility, as advocated by theologians like René Padilla and Samuel Escobar, underscores the church's role in addressing both the spiritual and material dimensions of people's lives.

#### Martyria: Witnessing Through Our Lives

Finally, *martyria*, or witness, encompasses our calling to testify to Christ's presence and power in every aspect of our lives. Acts 1:8 commissions us to be witnesses "to the ends of the earth." This

witness is not limited to verbal proclamation but extends to our actions, demonstrating the values of God's kingdom in our daily interactions.

Being a witness involves a holistic commitment to living out our faith in every sphere of life. It challenges us to integrate our beliefs with our work, relationships, and societal engagement, embodying the gospel in tangible ways. As Christians, we are called to be full-time disciples, constantly declaring God's excellency through our words and deeds.

#### **Prayer:**

Lord, we come before you this Summer, recognizing the profound opportunity you have given us to reset and renew our focus on the foundational values of koinonia, kerygma, diakonia, and martyria. Help us to embrace these principles fully, making Christ tangible, real, and visible in our world. Lord, we acknowledge that this season of reset is about creatively reimagining how we live out our faith in a changing world. Guide us to build communities of love that reflect your boundless compassion and unity. Empower us to proclaim the gospel of Christ with clarity and conviction, ensuring that our message is centered on His life, death, and resurrection. Let our lives be a living testimony to His love and grace. Strengthen our commitment to serve with compassion, reaching out to those in need and reflecting Your heart for justice and mercy. May our service be a beacon of hope and a tangible expression of Your love. Inspire us to witness through our lives, demonstrating the values of Your kingdom in our daily actions and interactions. May our faith be evident to all, drawing others to the light of Christ through our example.

So, what do these numbers mean? Our donations and pledges YTD are more than anticipated by \$716.79.


The Adjusted NUI happens below the NUI line because the principal on our loan is not considered an expense for accounting purposes, although the principal payment does come out of our checking account. Therefore, at the end of June our income was \$7,398.44 more than our total expenses. Our continued generosity is necessary to help us to be financially strong as the year progresses and our expenses catch up with the anticipated amounts.

As we sweat through the summer months and travel begins, let's remember to continue to be generous with our giving. Remember we still have to pay for the air-conditioning for our worshippers not lucky enough to be on vacation.

Maintenance and repairs continue throughout the campus with the help of vendors and volunteers. In June/July we were able to have the heating and air conditioning units throughout the campus serviced. Several minor repairs and plumbing repairs were completed by volunteers on campus.

Everyone please give a big "Thank you" to Max Rager for choosing our church park for his Eagle Scout project. Max and his helpful volunteers removed all the boards from all the park benches and tables and sanded them down. They then refinished them with a durable coating that we hope will keep them beautiful for years to come before replacing them. They also did some weeding and landscape maintenance to give our park a great new look for us and a blessing to our community.
